
My Proudest Moment

My mother is excellent. She is the best mother in the world. I know that there are some women smarter than my mother, but no one is like my mother. She is special to me.




My Favorite Path of Traveling




For the past ten years I have enjoyed being in Read Santa Clara.

murals, but only eight are still there. The most famous is the mural of the Drinkers.

The pyramid is the main tourist attraction in Cholula, receiving almost 500,000 visitors in 2017. The pyramid is a lot different today than when it was built. Over the centuries, grass and dirt covered

the pyramid so that it looked like a hill when the Spaniards arrived. The Spanish built a church on top of the pyramid called Church of Our Lady of Remedies in 1594. The site is still used as a Catholic church and by native people for an annual ritual.

Knowing where I come from would help me learn who I am and why I have this personality.


Prettyboyfredo


I Packed My Mom in My Heart

My husband, my son, and my mom would be wonderful company because they enjoy nature, just like me. Now I have to convince them that Costa Rica is their dream, too.


Traveling to Ethiopia
