- 5. Caring for cattle is hard work, which Drew does cheerfully. How does his father compensate him?

- 8. How old is Drew before he can openly grieve for his father's death? How long after that death does this happen? Where is Drew at the time?

- 22. What TV show forces Drew to face his family's origins? Some American states forbid schools to teach "minority history," which is Drew's history. Are we better or worse off learning "bad" truths about our ancestors?
