

Facts - Did you know?

Everything we see in the world around us has a shape. These geometric shapes appear in objects we see as credit cards, bills and coins, finger rings, photo frames, dart boards, huts, windows, magician's wands, tall buildings, flower pots, toy trains, and balloons.

Literacy Tip #1


Notice and point out the different shapes around you. This will help your child start to notice the differences, which will be helpful when they start to learn to read and need to differentiate between letters.

Discussion: Let's Talk About Shapes

Use these questions to help explore this concept!

- What are some shapes in this room?
- What is the shape of a wheel, of a door, or a book?
- What shape has 3 sides? What shapes have 4 sides? 5 sides?
- What shapes do you see in this book?
- Do any of these shapes look like things you have at home?
- What kinds of shapes can you find outside?
- What is your favorite shape and why?

Activity #2: Shape Cards



Use the shape cards to explore everyday objects that resemble that shape. Use these images to introduce new vocabulary words as well!

Literacy Tip #2

Before children learn letters, they are aware of shapes. Before they have the coordination to hold a crayon and write they can move their whole arms and bodies. Make a circle shape with your whole body.

Songs & Rhymes
