Facts - Did you know?

Did you know National Opposite day is January 25th? Antonym is a word that means the opposite of a word.

Activity #1: Object Comparisons

Literacy Tip #1

Use specific names for things when you talk with your child, like cat and kitten, you help your children learn new words and you help them understand differences between similar things.

Discussion: Let's Talk About Opposites

Use these questions to help explore this concept!

- What are some opposites you see in this room?
- What can we put on top of the chair? What can we put under the chair?
- Which toy is small and which toy is big?
- What can you do with your body to illustrate opposites? *hint open and close
- What are some opposites you can think of?
- Have your toddler perform actions, and you do the opposite. For example, if they sit down, you stand up, if they walk forward, you walk backward.

Activity #2: Flashcards

Use the flash cards to practice identifying the different types of opposites. Ask your child what they see in the picture and why these images are paired.



Literacy Tip #2

In order to learn, children need a lot of repetition. they need to hear words over and over again as you do things together. they love to read favorite books over and over again. It may get boring for you, but their brains need repetition to learn language.

Songs & Rhymes

Song: This is Big, Big, Big
This is big, big, big,
This is small, small, small.
This is short, short, short,
This is tall, tall
This is fast, fast, fast
This is slow, slow, slow
This is yes, yes, yes,
This is no, no, no!

Action Rhyme: Two Little Blackbirds

Two little blackbirds sitting on a hill. One named Jack and one name Jill. Fly away Jack, Fly away Jill. Come back Jack, come back Jill.

Two little blackbirds sitting on a pole. One named Fast and one named Slow.

Two little blackbirds sitting on a cloud. One name Quiet and one named Loud.

Try This at Home



Explore opposites at around the house:

- Have your child turn "on" the lights then turn "off" the lights.
- Explore "high" and "low" by picking your child up.
- Examine "a lot" and "a little" at snack time, by providing examples of both.
- Play with "empty" and "full" with containers or at bath time.



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
