Vocabulary to Practice

- Curriculum: The subjects and content taught in a specific educational program or course.
- Assessment: The process of evaluating students' knowledge and skills through tests, exams, or other methods.
- Literacy: The ability to read and write proficiently.
- Tutor: A person who provides individualized instruction and support to a student outside of regular classroom hours.
- E-Learning: The use of electronic technology to deliver educational content and facilitate learning, often through online courses or platforms.
- Extracurricular Activities: Activities and programs outside of the regular curriculum that provide additional learning opportunities and experiences for students.
- Dropout: A student who leaves school before completing their education.
- Special Education: Programs and support designed for students with learning or physical disabilities.
- Syllabus: An outline or summary of topics and assignments covered in a course.
- Graduation: The ceremony marking the completion of a course of study or educational program.
- Scholarships: Financial aid or grants awarded to students based on academic achievement or other criteria.
- Research: The systematic investigation and study of a subject to gain new knowledge or insights.
- Lecture: A formal oral presentation given by a teacher or professor to a group of students.
- Diploma: A certificate awarded upon the successful completion of an educational program or course.
- Principal: The head or leader of a school who is responsible for its administration.
- Classroom: A room where a teacher conducts lessons and instruction for a group of students.
- Student: A person who attends and receives education at a school or educational institution.
- Teacher: An educator who imparts knowledge and instruction to students in a school.
- Textbook: A book used as the primary source of study material for a particular subject.
- Homework: Assignments and tasks given to students to be completed outside of regular class time.
- Backpack: A bag carried by students to carry books, supplies, and other belongings to school.
- Cafeteria: A dining area in a school where students can purchase and eat meals.
- Recess: A break during the school day when students can play and socialize outside the classroom.
- Library: A place within the school that houses a collection of books and other resources for research and reading.
- Playground: An outdoor area in the school where students can play and engage in recreational activities.
- Report Card: A document that provides an assessment of a student's academic performance and behavior.
- Attendance: The act of being present and attending school regularly.
- P.E. (Physical Education): A subject in the school curriculum that focuses on physical activities and fitness.
- Bell: A signaling device used in schools to mark the beginning and end of classes and breaks.
