Vocabulary to Practice

- Halloween (noun) the night of 31st October, especially in the US, when children dress up as ghosts, witches, etc., and go to people's houses to ask for candy.
- Costume (noun) a set of clothes worn in order to look like someone or something else, especially for a party or as part of an event such as Halloween.
- Trick-or-treating (noun) a custom on Halloween in which children go from house to house, asking for candy and threatening to play tricks on those who refuse.
- Pumpkin (noun) a large, round vegetable with hard, yellow or orange flesh.
- Jack-o'-lantern (noun) a hollowed-out pumpkin with a face carved into it and a light inside, traditionally made and displayed at Halloween.
- Ghost (noun) the spirit of a dead person, sometimes represented as a pale, almost transparent image of that person.
- Witch (noun) a woman who is believed to have magical powers and who uses them to harm or help other people.
- Spider (noun) a small creature with eight legs, often found in webs inside buildings.
- Bat (noun) a small, flying mammal that comes out at night to feed on insects.
- Haunted (adjective) describes a place where ghosts are often thought to appear.
- Scary (adjective) frightening or causing fear.
- Candy (noun) a sweet food made from sugar or chocolate, usually eaten between meals.
- Skeleton (noun) the structure of bones that supports the body of a person or an animal.
- Vampire (noun) in stories, a dead person who comes back to life at night and sucks the blood of living people.
- Monster (noun) any imaginary frightening creature, especially one that is large and strange.
- Spooky (adjective) strange and frightening.
- Costume party (noun) a social event where the guests dress up in costumes according to a specific theme.
- Frighten (verb) to make someone afraid or anxious.
- Cobweb (noun) a net of sticky threads made by a spider to catch insects.
- Creepy (adjective) causing an unpleasant feeling of fear or unease.
