- Participate: (verb) To take part in something; to be involved in an activity.
- Habits: (noun, plural) Regular customs or practices that someone does, often without thinking.
- Typical: (adjective) Usual or ordinary; the kind of thing that happens most often.
- Looking forward: (verb phrase) To feel happy or excited about something that is going to happen in the future.
- Experienced: (adjective) Having had a lot of practice or knowledge of something.
- Ideal: (adjective) Perfect or the best possible; exactly what would be wanted.
- Poem: (noun) A piece of writing that expresses ideas and feelings in a beautiful and imaginative way, often using rhyme and rhythm.
