Conversation Questions in Groups of 2 People:

- 1. What do you think are the biggest differences between being a child and being an adult in terms of freedom and responsibility?
- 2. Making Your Own Choices: Do you enjoy the feeling of being able to make your own decisions as an adult? S
- 3. Do you think it's important for adults to be able to learn from their mistakes and become more independent?
- 4. What does financial independence mean to you? Is it important to be able to support yourself financially as an adult? Why?
- 5. Have you ever lived by yourself away from family? What were some challenges and rewards of this experience?
- 6. As an adult, what are some new responsibilities you have for taking care of yourself (e.g., cooking, cleaning, managing bills)?
- 7. What are some important life skills you think you need to be independent as an adult? (e.g., communication, budgeting)
- 8. Do you think it's important for adults to continue learning and growing throughout their lives? Why or why not?
- 9. Do you feel more comfortable expressing your opinions and ideas as an adult? Why or why not?
- 10. Even though you're more independent, do you think it's still important to have a strong support system of friends and family? Why or why not?
- 11. Can being too independent be lonely sometimes?
- 12. Do you think there are differences in how different cultures view independence for adults? Share your thoughts.
- 13. Do you think some aspects of being independent, like managing money and bills, are learned through experience?
